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Over 50,000 Americans Endorse M2Z's Free Nationwide Wireless Broadband Plan

Supporters Tell FCC: "Free Broadband Now"

Menlo Park, CA (August 22, 2007) - M2Z Networks, Inc. ("M2Z") today announced that to date, over 50,000 Americans from across the country have signed a petition in support of the company's pending license application before the Federal Communications Commission (FCC) to lease fallow spectrum to deliver its free, fast and family friendly wireless broadband Internet service nationwide. This groundswell of support, which already includes hundreds of federal, state, and local elected officials as well as numerous advocacy groups, marks another milestone in demonstrating that M2Z's plan serves the public interest. M2Z is urging the FCC to take prompt action to approve its license application, which has now been pending at the FCC for over 15 months.

"As the FCC evaluates whether M2Z's application is in the public interest, one thing is clear: the public is interested. Consumer support for free nationwide wireless broadband has been overwhelming and is a strong endorsement of M2Z's vision for the next generation of Internet access and connectivity," said Kathleen Wallman, a Senior Advisor to M2Z Networks and Chief Organizer of the Coalition for Free Broadband Now, which participated in the petition drive on behalf of M2Z. "More than 50,000 Americans have raised their voices to express support for M2Z's plan to bridge the digital divide and provide equal access to the information superhighway, and our support is growing everyday."

The petition endorsements were collected online and in-person by advocates around the country, by M2Z, its partner organizations, and by the Coalition for Free Broadband Now. (www.FreeBroadbandNow.org)

According to Alec Ross, Executive Vice President of One Economy Corporation, a national not-for-profit corporation that works with technology companies and community activists to bring

affordable broadband to underserved communities, “The fact that M2Z Networks, a small Silicon Valley startup, can build such an enormous base of grassroots support in only a few months is a testimonial to the need for greater digital inclusion in our society. Ensuring equal access to the incredible opportunities that broadband connectivity holds in store is an extremely important issue to all Americans.”

The petition, filed today in the public record at the FCC (Docket Nos. 07-16 and 07-30), reinforces already strong support among the American public for M2Z’s application to provide free wireless broadband service across the country. In April 2007, M2Z released the results of a bipartisan nationwide poll conducted by Voter Consumer Research and Lake Research Partners showing that Republicans and Democrats alike agree that all Americans should have equal access to broadband Internet. Further, two-thirds of those surveyed supported the FCC granting a license to provide a free wireless broadband service across the United States, as M2Z plans to do upon approval of its application. In addition to the petition signatures of over 50,000 individuals, the M2Z public record now consists of over 2,000 filings, including support from hundreds of federal, state and local elected officials who have indicated strong bi-partisan support for granting M2Z's license. Additionally, M2Z’s application has garnered support from leading advocates on issues such as the digital divide, online child and family safety, economic development and national economic competitiveness from such organizations as Media Access Project, Public Knowledge, the Minority Media and Telecommunications Council, ACORN and the National PTA. Background

M2Z Networks currently has an application before the FCC to lease 20MHz of fallow spectrum to build a nationwide network to offer fast, free and family friendly broadband to 95 percent of the U.S. population within ten years. The service will be supported by locally targeted search results and will include a network-level filter to shield children using the service from indecent content. If licensed, M2Z would pay the U.S. Treasury 5 percent of annual gross revenues from its premium subscription services, which could total payments of up to \$1 billion over 15 years. The introduction of M2Z’s broadband service would generate \$18 to \$32 billion in direct consumer benefits over the next 15 years according to two uncontested economic studies.

Founded in 2005 and headquartered in Menlo Park, Calif., M2Z Networks’ goal is to transform the current state of the broadband marketplace by building a high-speed wireless network throughout the United States. In May 2006, the company submitted a license application to the FCC to construct and operate a nationwide broadband wireless network in the 2155-2175 MHz spectrum band. Approval of the application would guarantee delivery of free, fast and family-friendly wireless broadband service to at least 95 percent of Americans in a 10 year timeframe. M2Z is backed by Kleiner, Perkins, Caufield and Byers; Charles River Ventures; and Redpoint Ventures; three of the most successful venture capital firms in Silicon Valley with \$5 billion of capital under management.
